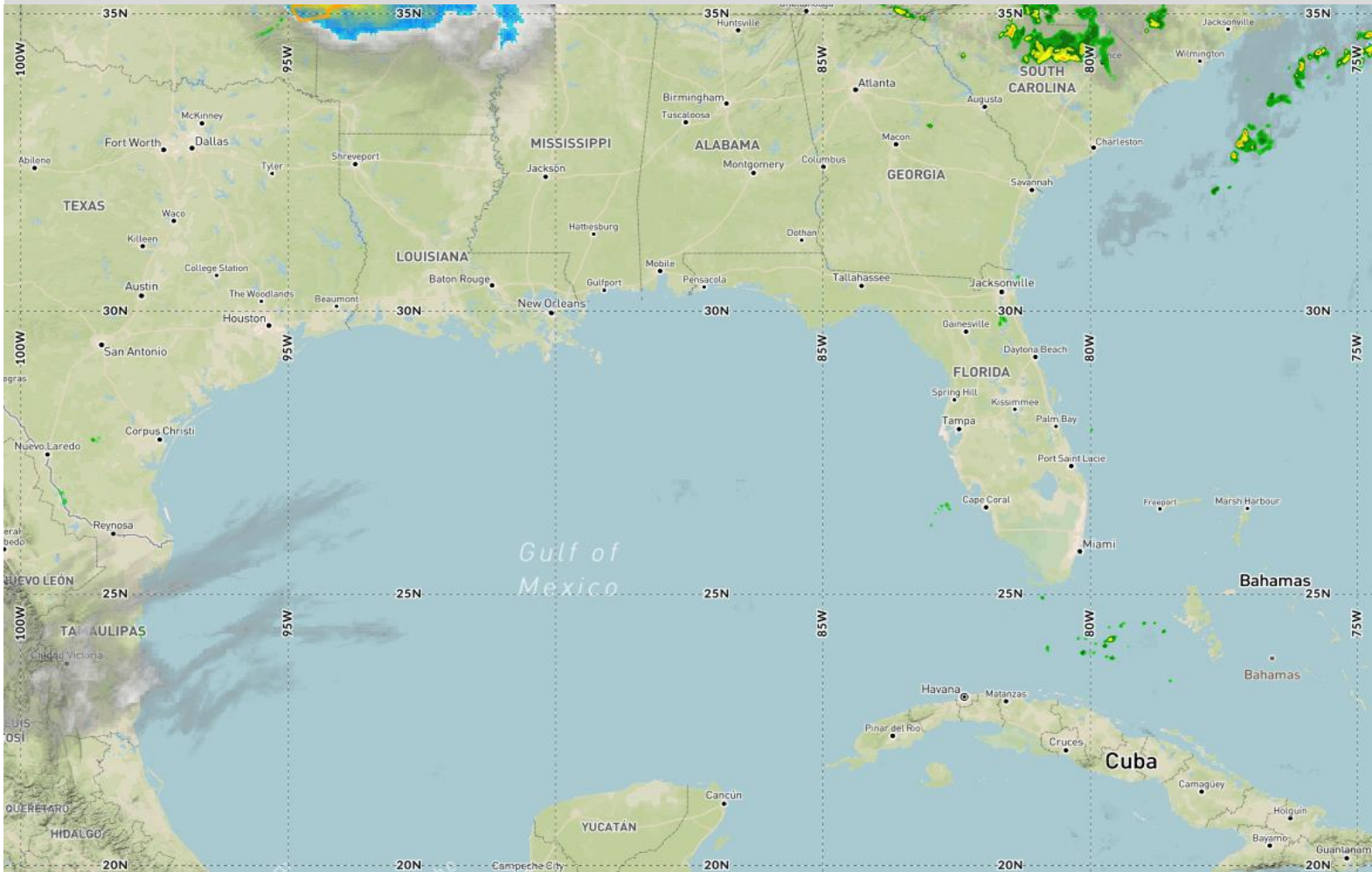

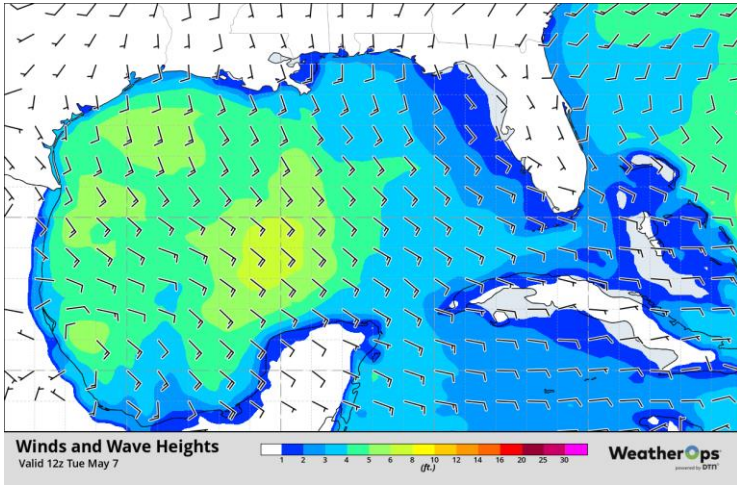
Today and Tomorrow's Weather

The Gulf of Mexico remains under the influence of the strong high pressure in the central Atlantic. The high pressure and associated mid level dry air will continue to lead to dry conditions. Moderate to fresh southerly breezes will continue as well as 4-6 foot seas. A few strong wind gusts cannot be ruled out. Conditions will remain generally unchanged through tomorrow afternoon, before a low pressure system over the Mississippi Valley and associated cold front bring a pattern change to the Gulf.

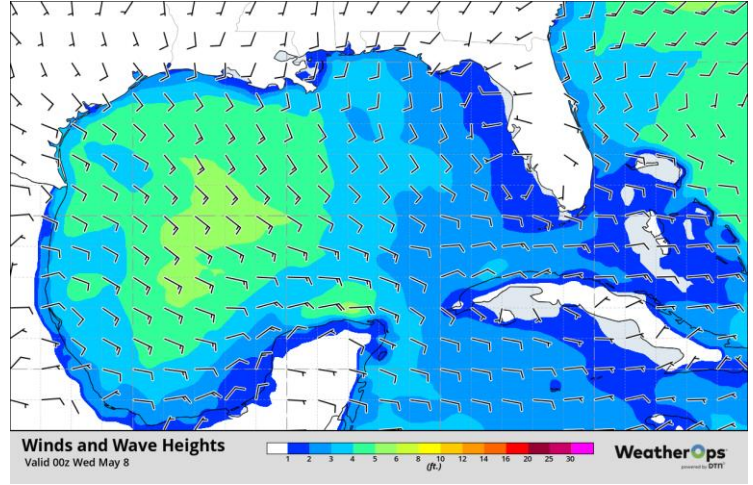
Day Three through Seven Weather Hazards

Two areas of low pressure are expected to develop Thursday and Friday. One to the west near the Mexico/U.S. border and one to the north over the Mississippi Valley. The low pressure to the west will generally move south through the mid-week with little influence on the Gulf. The one to the north will strengthen and drag a cold front across the northern portions of the Gulf Thursday into Friday. Some thunderstorms are possible along the coast. Winds will shift to the north, likely quickly. Moderate breezes will continue on both sides of the front, as it is expected to remain across the central Gulf into the weekend. Minimal changes in seas are expected.

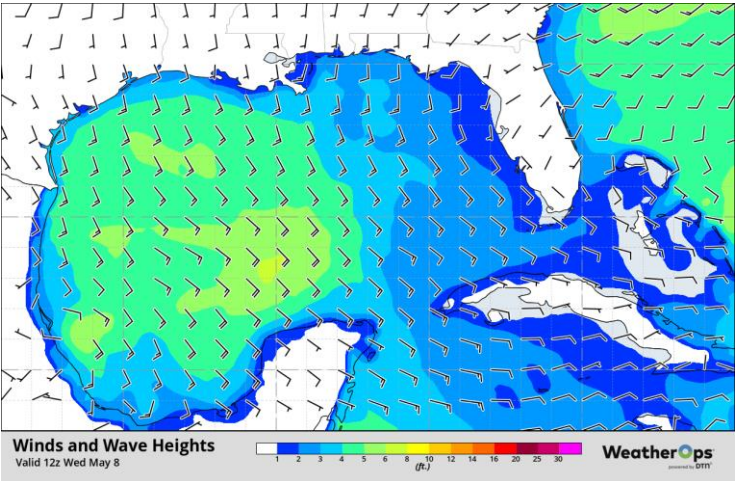
## This Morning's Winds and Seas



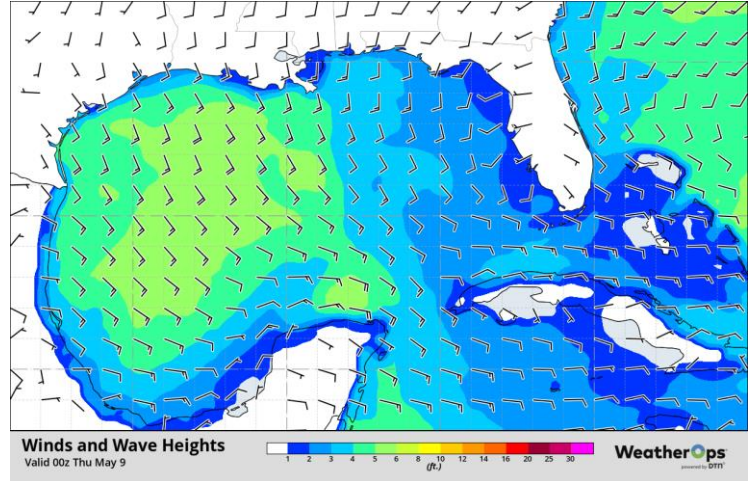
## This Evening's Winds and Seas



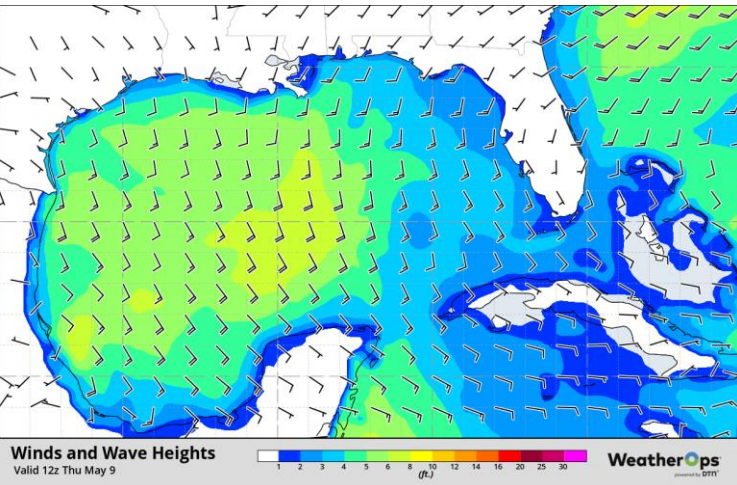
## Tomorrow Morning's Winds and Seas



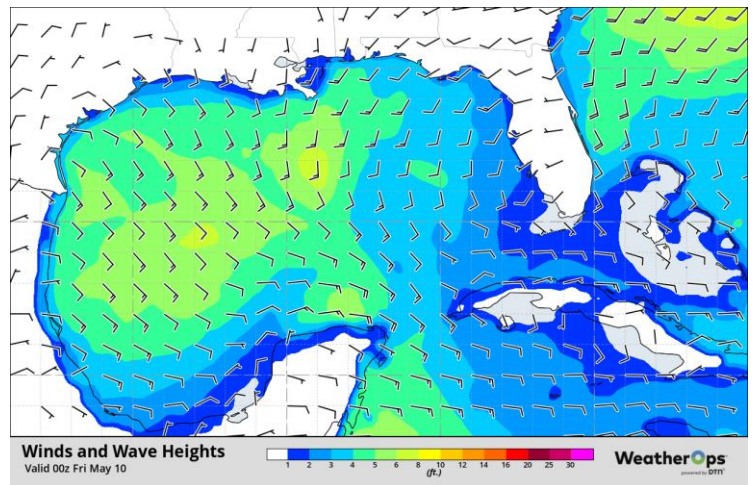
## Tomorrow Evening's Winds and Seas

## Day 3 Evening Wind and Seas



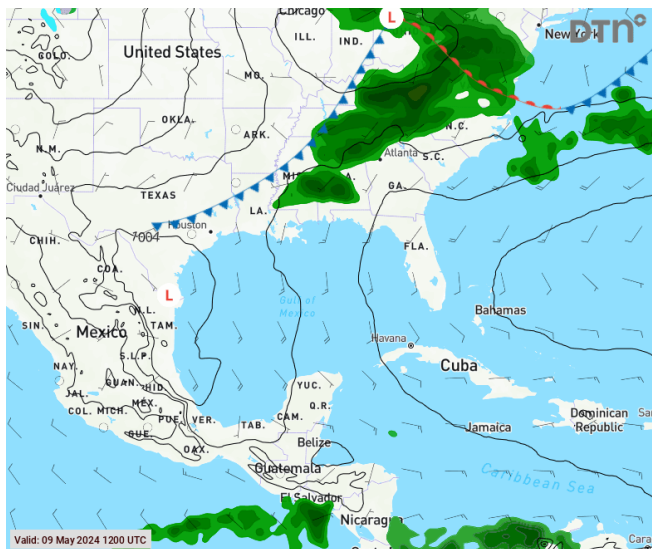
## Day 1 Surface Chart



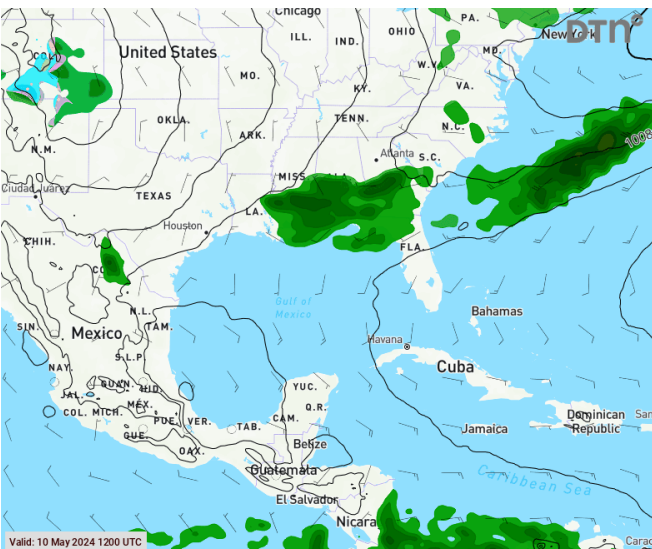

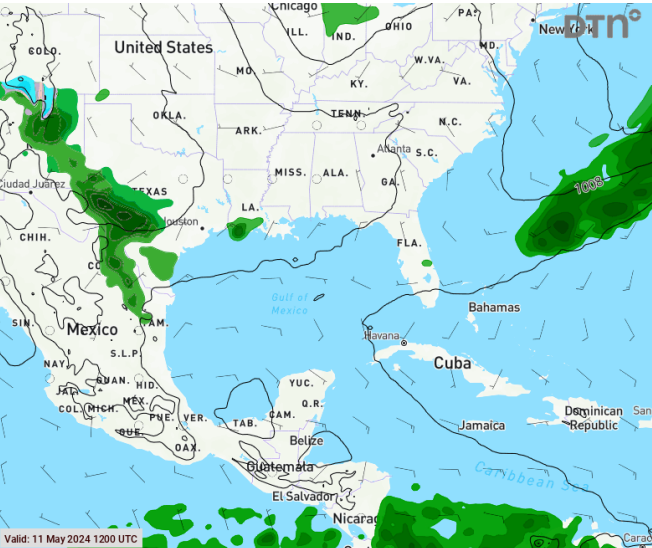
